

**A message from the Secretaries of Revenue and Aging...**

Dear Fellow Pennsylvanians,

We are proud to share with you the Pennsylvania Lottery's significant positive impact on older Pennsylvanians, on its players and on communities throughout the state. The Pennsylvania Lottery remains the only Lottery in the nation that devotes all proceeds to programs that benefit older residents.

Pennsylvania ranks third among states with the largest proportion of adults over 60 and 65. As Pennsylvania's older population grows, we are committed to growing along with it. To this end, the Lottery achieved record-breaking sales and contributions to the Lottery Fund in Fiscal Year 2005-06. Having topped last year's sales record by \$425 million, the Lottery achieved the highest, single-year dollar increase in its 34-year history. Sales for fiscal year 2005-06 climbed to \$3.07 billion, and the Lottery raised more than \$975 million for the Lottery Fund.

Last year Governor Rendell signed into law the largest property tax cut in Pennsylvania history. Older Pennsylvanians will get additional property tax relief through a major expansion of the Lottery-funded Property Tax/Rent Rebate program. The expanded Property Tax/Rent Rebate program will completely eliminate school property taxes for more than 200,000 seniors and it will help an additional 420,000 seniors pay their property taxes or rent.

Additionally, the Lottery continues to fund the nation's most comprehensive prescription program for older adults, PACE, PACENET and PACE Plus Medicare; free and reduced-fare transit; and 52 Area Agencies on Aging, including more than 650 full- and part-time senior centers throughout Pennsylvania.

This annual Economic and Benefit Impact Report illustrates how Pennsylvania's communities were impacted by the Lottery in Fiscal Year 2005-06. It outlines where and how Lottery moneys were distributed to each county and program. Prize payouts and retailer commissions contributed to local economies, and net revenues provided important benefits to older Pennsylvanians, all across the Commonwealth.
